

Lithium battery pack has a smell





Overview

Lithium-ion batteries do not usually smell minty. A sweet smell could indicate leaking cells. This situation requires immediate investigation because of possible fire risks. If you suspect a leak, handle the battery carefully and dispose of it properly. Do lithium ion batteries smell?

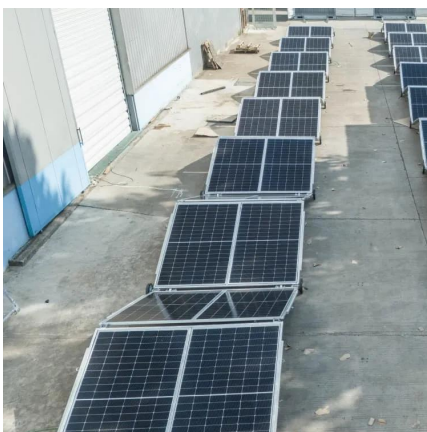

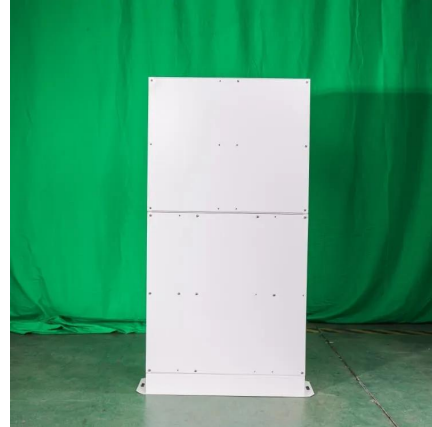
